

The basics **Testing**



We recommend that you discuss the information in this leaflet with a doctor or other health worker.

Regular health checks allow you to be sure that you are in good health.

A health check can include testing to see if you have HIV.

Testing is:

Free - there's no charge in NHS services Voluntary - it's your choice

to test or not


Confidential - the result will not be given to other people without your permission

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There are lots of places you can test for HIV:


At home, using a self-test Sexual health clinics GP surgeries Community testing projects clinic or hospital **for any reason**, the doctor may offer you an HIV test.

When you attend a



Depending on the test used, you may need to provide:

A drop of blood from your finger Blood from your arm Fluid from your mouth




Depending on which test is used, the result will be available within a few minutes or within two weeks.



If you have recently taken a risk (for example, had sex without a condom), you may be asked to **come back for another test** in a few months. This is to be sure the result is accurate. When all the necessary tests have been done, the result will be 'HIV negative' or 'HIV positive'.

HIV negative = You don't have HIV

HIV positive = You have HIV



Important points

You can take a test on your own or with a healthcare worker.

Testing for HIV is free, voluntary and confidential.

Notes

'Rapid' HIV tests and self-tests provide results in 30 minutes or less.

- If the result is 'HIV negative', you don't have HIV and you don't need any more tests.
- If the result is 'reactive', this means that you need to have another blood test done.
- An 'HIV positive' result cannot be given from just a rapid HIV test or a self-test.
